
Nana's Cozy Corner

One Year of Solar Power

October 2023 marked the first anniversary of solar power at Green Tech Station. Our system on the site includes 24 solar panels placed on the rooftop of the pavilion, which have generated 10,000 kWh of electricity so far. The solar installation serves as an important environmental education piece for tour groups and the community. We are proud to display alternative sources of energy at GTS that will have a positive impact on the environment for years to come.

WaterMarks Poetry Workshop

On April 8th, NWSCDC partnered with WaterMarks to host a Poetry Workshop at the Century City Tower building. Local Poets, Kavon Cortez Jones, Nakeysha Roberts Washington, and Portia Cobb facilitated the session. Nearby Garden Homes neighbors and community members attended, participating in creative activities and short writing sessions. Consistent themes relating to water were explored, commemorating the WaterMarker planned for Green Tech Station.

REINVESTING FOR THE NEXT GENERATION.

WaterMarker Installation

Green Tech Station was honored to be the first North Side location to have a WaterMarker. The installation took place on May 31st, as a blue letter G was placed 30 ft in the sky. The letter was chosen by the community, to represent: gather, growth, grit and Garden Homes. The WaterMarker acts as a light, powered by solar power, flashing during times when heavy rain is expected to notify residents to reduce their water usage. Students and tour groups can also access free wifi at Green Tech Station provided by the WaterMarker.

WEST BASIN STORMWATER MANAGEMENT PROJECT

Designs for the site, located at 4350 N. 35th Street, have continued to progress with the valuable input of residents and stakeholders. Residents conversed with MMSD, learning updates about the West Basin Project and sharing their ideas about the design.



NORTH SIDE POP-UP FARMERS MARKET

NWSCDC hosted its 4th Annual North Side Pop-up Farmers Market on Tuesdays in August. Four markets throughout the month took place at four different North Side locations including: Ascension All Saints Family Health Center, the MMSD West Basin, Century City Business Park and the Embassy Center. Products at this year's markets included: fresh fruits and veggies, herbs, honey, tea, rice, salsa, desserts, plants, essential oils, soap and crafts. UWM Mobile Story Cart had a booth at most of the markets, collecting stories from residents to help properly depict food stories. The project aims to shed light on the issue of food access, which aligns with the mission of the North Side Pop-up Farmers Market, to promote healthy foods and lifestyles.

2023 marked a significant time for Melvina Park, located within the Century City Triangle Neighborhood. After years of planning, the park held two Ground Breaking ceremonies with the community and City leaders. The redevelopment project will create a larger park for residents to enjoy, address minor environmental contamination, and show working examples of stormwater management practices. Construction is currently in progress and expected to be completed in 2024.

EQUITABLE TRAIL DEVELOPMENT

Promise Zone Bike Ride

NWSCDC would love to see the North Side of Milwaukee become a more bike friendly environment. We support the idea of bringing a rail with trail concept to the 30th Street Industrial Corridor, to improve the quality of life for residents and spur economic growth. NWSCDC believes safe places to walk and bike are key to sustainable community economic development.





In 2023 we celebrated the 6th annual Promise Zone Bike Ride during Bike Week in June. Over 70 community members participated in the 6-mile bike ride showcasing North Side neighborhoods and nearby developments. Stops along the route included: Green Tech Station, the MMSD West Basin, Stark Playfield and Custer Playfield, and other points of interest. Excitement and momentum, with hopes for a future trail, could be felt by participants in attendance. We can't wait for our 2024 bike ride, happening June 1st!

Soul Roll MKE

The Promise Zone Bike Ride was a part of a larger initiative being developed in 2023 called "Soul Roll MKE". Numerous partners from around Milwaukee collaborated in planning a master calendar of dozens of biking events happening in Milwaukee. Soul Roll MKE's goal is to promote biking throughout Milwaukee, specifically throughout the 30th Street Industrial Corridor, which is lined with a railroad. The hope is to have a rail with trail system in the central corridor of the city to significantly improve the amount of residents that have access to a recreation trail. RECOMPETE PILOT PROGRAM

GROW MILWAUKEE RECOMPETE COALITION

On December 20th. 2023 the Biden-Harris Administration announced the selection of 22 Finalists for the U.S. Economic Development Administration's Recompete Pilot Program. The Grow Milwaukee Recompete Coalition was selected among the Phase 1 Finalists, looking to advance a plan that could potentially bring 50 million dollars of investment into Milwaukee's 30th Street Industrial Corridor area. Fach finalist was awarded a Strategy Development Grant that will allow applicants the support to further develop their plan that will be analyzed in Phase Two. The Grow Milwaukee Recompete Coalition, led by NWSCDC, is made up of a diverse group of partners, including: the Milwaukee Bucks, Rockwell Automation. Milwaukee School of Engineering, Milwaukee Area Labor Council, WRTP | Big Step, JobsWork MKE, City of Milwaukee, Milwaukee County, Wisconsin **Economic Development Corporation** (WEDC), Jonco Industries, MKE Tech Hub, Altius Building Company, Eaton Corp and more. The Grow Milwaukee Recompete Coalition Plan focuses on manufacturing business expansion and job creation in an area of the city that has experienced historic disinvestment for decades.
